




Colorano Silk. Astronaut taking the first step on the Moon.




C. S. Anderson. Map of the annexed territory.



First Day Cover stamps - like the one on this engraved envelope - may be issued only by an Act of Congress and usually make their appearance at about one month intervals in connection with events of national significance. These stamps are interesting as collectors' items and have become quite valuable in some instances.







THE WILD TURKEY

The crisp, fall morning is suddenly shattered by the waking call of a woodland bird. Soon, this magnificent bird is seen strutting through the woodlands that are its home . . . its feathers of bronze, gold, green and purple radiating like gems in the morning sun. This is the Wild Turkey, a bird that so inspired Benjamin Franklin that he introduced a resolution in Congress proposing that it be named as our national bird. A strong flier, well able to soar over a mile on its sixty inch wingspan, the Wild Turkey will more often choose to run instead. The Turkey is capable of running at fifteen miles per hour. The noted authority, John J. Audubon, once trailed on horseback several Turkeys for several hours and was not able to catch up with them. A bird able to adapt to many environments, the Turkey may be found

living on mountain slopes or near swamps. The diet of the Wild Turkey consists of insects, grapes, grass, seeds and nuts. A hardy bird, the Turkey will scratch through a foot of snow to steal a rodent's cache of nuts during a hard winter. While the Wild Turkey was once nearly overhunted to the point of extinction, this most noble of all game birds has made a remarkable comeback. Nearly three million Turkeys are now found in the contiguous forty-eight states and the continued propagation of the Turkeys has been assured by the dedicated work of the National Wild Turkey Federation. Since 1973, the Federation has worked to set aside thousands of acres of prime habitat for the Wild Turkey, making certain that future generations will be able to enjoy this native American bird.



The postmark at Philadelphia shows that it was mailed in the city where the stamps are being sold for the first time, and on the first day of sale. You already know that October 4 is National Newspaperboy Day and that is why this date was selected.

You can be very proud to have this honor, just as you are proud every day of the fine service you render when delivering or selling your copies of the Register and Tribune.

The envelope, the stamp on it, and this letter will be valuable keep-sakes through your life, to show that you were a "newspaperboy" at the time this stamp was issued. Your teachers and classmates will be interested in seeing your genuine "First Day Cover" and commemorative stamp. We feel sure that many carrier salesmen will show them to customers also with a great deal of pride.

Stamp collectors like "First Day Covers" and usually pay 20¢ to 25¢ for one when new, often a larger amount later.

All through the years it has been an honorable thing for boys to have the important responsibility of supplying people with newspapers. 





