Who was Daniel Webster?

- Born January 18, 1782, in Salisbury, NH (present day Franklin, NH)
- An American lawyer who argued over 200 cases before the U.S.
 Supreme Court
- Among three members of the Great Triumvirate alongside Henry Clay and Vice President John C. Calhoun
- A key supporter of President John

- A proud member of the Whig Party
- Represented New Hampshire & Massachusetts in U.S. Congress (House & Senate)
- The 14th and 19th U.S. Secretary of State and served under Presidents William Henry Harrison, John Tyler, and Millard Fillmore
- Died October 24, 1852, in Marshfield, MA

How has he been memorialized?

- Daniel Webster Highway and Mount Webster in New Hampshire
- Statue in the Nat'l Statuary Hall Collection and many others
- 3 Ships: U.S. Navy Submarine, a Liberty Ship, & a Steamboat

- Been portrayed by 7 different actors in films and plays




1932 Commemorative: Daniel Webster

#725 - October 24, 1932


- 3 official first day cities in New Hampshire (Franklin, Exeter, Hanover)
- Celebrated the 150th anniversary of Daniel Webster's birth year but came out on the 80th anniversary of his death
- First Daniel Webster U.S. stamp issued for regular mail (first-class letter rate)
- Issued during the "George Washington Bicentennial Year" where thousands upon thousands of event covers were made all year long needing stamps






1969 Commemorative: Dartmouth College Case

#1380 - September 22, 1969

- 150th anniversary of the Dartmouth College Case which Daniel Webster argued before the Supreme Court reasserting the sanctity of contracts
- Webster gradated from Dartmouth in 1801
- "Webster Hall" at Dartmouth College houses the Special Collections Library, which holds some of Webster's personal belongings and writings, including his beaver fur top hat and silk socks





THE DARTMOUTH CASE DANIEL WEBSTER'S LEGAL MONUMENT

A squabble at Dartmouth College ended in a historic legal decision that helped stimulate the industrial development of the United States.

That ruling is recalled by this new commemorative stamp, issued at Hanover, New Hampshire, site of the Dartmouth campus.

As the illustration indicates, Dartmouth was chartered (by King George III) to educate American Indians. Later, however, the New Hampshire Legislature amended the charter and assumed control of camous affairs.



The decision held that a charter was a contract, and that states could not easily abrogate contracts. Thus, the invested capital of corporations (chartered companies) was safe from legislative interference, which did much to encourage investment and the 19th Century growth of U.S. industry.



Webster-Dartmouth
Commemorative Sept. 22

COLLEGE controversies a renot new to the American scene. In fact, one of the most famous campus capers, which resulted in a landmark case before the Supreme Court, occurred 150 years ago and is being commemorated on a new U. S. stamp to be issued Sept. 22.

The monumental legal decision — the Dartmouth College Case — was argued by Daniel Webster before the Supreme Court. The new 6-cent stamps will feature a portrait of Webster with Dartmouth Hall in the background. First-day ceremonies will be at Hanover, N. H., on Sept. 22.

The case involved the school's removal of its president by the board of directors. In reprisal, the New Hampshire legislature revoked Dartmouth's charter, established a rival institution and named the deposed president to head it.




The legal issue was whether a charter was: a contract, and if so, could the legislature revoke a privilege it had not granted. Webster, a Dartmouth graduate, argued the case successfully before the top court and thereby reasserted the sanctity of contracts.

Collectors desiring first-day cancellations may send addressed envelopes, together with remittance to cover the cost of the stamps to be affixed, to the Postmaster, Hanover, N. H. 03744. The outside envelope to the postmaster should be endorsed "First-Day Covers 6c Deartmouth College C as e Stamp." Cover requests must be postmarked no later than Sept. 22.

The 6-cent stamp commemorating the monumental legal decision—the Dartmouth College Case—which Daniel Webster won before the Supreme Court a hundred and fifty years ago, will be first placed on sale at Hanover, New Hampshire, on September 22, 1969.

What began as a campus squabble erupted into a national issue that resulted in the famed Dartmouth College Case. The school's board of trustees had removed the President. In reprisal, the New Hampshire legislature revoked the school's charter, established a rival institution, Dartmouth University, and named the deposed President to head it.

The legal issue at stake was whether a charter was a contract and, if so, could the legislature revoke a privilege it had not granted. Daniel Webster, perhaps Dartmouth's most famous graduate, argued the case successfully before the Supreme Court, and the decision reasserted the sanctity of contracts.


The green vertical stamp was designed by John R. Scotford, Jr., Assistant Director of Dartmouth's Hopkins Center for the Creative and Performing Arts. It depicts Daniel Webster, with Dartmouth Hall in the background. It will be issued in panes of 50, with an initial printing of 120 million.

Collectors desiring first day cancellations may send addressed envelopes, together with remittance to cover the cost of the stamps to be affixed, to the Postmaster, Hanover, New Hampshire 03755. The outside envelope should be endorsed "First Day Covers Dartmouth College Case Stamp," and postmarked no later than September 22, 1969.







The "Dan'l Webster"

The "Dan'l Webster" is the first of three prototypes of low center of gravity, lightweight trains to be tried out by the New Haven Railroad. The cars were built by Pullman-Standard and the train is powered by a 1,000 hp Baldwin-Lima-Hamilton new type diesel on each end. It seats 392 passengers in nine, 45½-ft. units. Exterior of the New Haven train introduces an innovation—a surface of colored aluminum. Each car has a dark gray finish contrasted with natural metallic aluminum. The surface of colored aluminum is as hard as sapphire. Extensive use of vinyls and plastics give the interior a decorative yet easy to maintain design. Cars are suspended on air springs which insure constant height for excellent riding comfort. The locomotive represents several new concepts in motive power based on the German Maybach diesel in use for over 15 years in Europe. A high-speed, V-type engine, it delivers its power through a mec-hydro hydraulic transmission, also German-designed.
